

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
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
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A NOTE OF GRATITUDE

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

THE Winter's TALE

ACT I

At the palace of Leontes, King of Sicilia, Archidamus of Bohemia and Camillo of Sicilia discuss a future visit of Leontes to Bohemia; the friendship of Leontes and Polixenes, the King of Bohemia; and the future hopes for Leontes' son Mamillius.

Polixenes, who has been visiting Leontes for nine months, asks to return home. Leontes tries to persuade him to stay longer and then asks Hermione, Leontes' wife, to sway him. After she succeeds, Leontes suddenly becomes convinced that Polixenes and Hermione are having an affair and that Hermione's soon-to-be born child is Polixenes'. When Polixenes and Hermione exit, Leontes asks Camillo to poison Polixenes. After Leontes storms off, Camillo warns Polixenes and plans their escape to Bohemia.

ACT II

Mamillius is about to tell Hermione a sad tale about winter when Leontes bursts in, accuses Hermione of adultery, and has her sent to prison. Antigonus and a lord try to convince Leontes that Hermione is innocent. Leontes announces he has sent Cleomenes and Dion to the oracle of Apollo to find out the truth.

Paulina visits Hermione's prison and finds out from Emilia that Hermione has given birth to a daughter.

Paulina brings the newborn to Leontes. After an argument, Paulina exits, and Leontes has Antigonus swear to abandon the princess in the wilderness.

SYNOPSIS

ACT III

Cleomenes and Dion discuss the impressive ceremonies at the oracle of Apollo and express their hope that Hermione will be found innocent.

The public trial of Hermione begins. After Hermione delivers a speech in her defense, the oracle is read, proclaiming Hermione innocent. Leontes rejects the oracle and orders the trial to continue. A servant enters and announces that Mamillius, who has been ill, has died. Hermione faints and is carried out. Leontes repents of his madness, then Paulina enters, announcing that Hermione is also dead. Leontes vows to live a life of penance.

In Bohemia, Antigonus and a Mariner bring the princess and a box with identifying objects ashore. Antigonus discusses a dream he had of Hermione who told him the princess should be named Perdita. He leaves the baby and is chased away by a bear. A shepherd looking for his lost sheep finds Perdita. The Shepherd's son, the Clown, relates how the bear has eaten Antigonus and a storm has sunk the ship he came on. The Shepherd decides to raise Perdita as his own.

ACT IV

Time, the Chorus, announces that sixteen years have passed since the end of Act III.

At Polixenes' palace in Bohemia, Camillo asks Polixenes for permission to return to Sicilia. Polixenes says he needs Camillo's help in finding out what his son Florizel has been doing at a certain shepherd's cottage.

Autolycus, a peddler and a rogue, discusses his life on the road. He sees the Shepherd's son on his way to the market to buy goods for the sheep shearing festival pretends to be injured, and picks the Clown's pocket.

At the Shepherd's cottage, Perdita is getting ready for the sheep shearing festival. She and Florizel discuss their love and the problem of their differing social

status. The Shepherd enters with some strangers—Polixenes and Camillo disguised—and Perdita hands out flowers to the assembly. A dance of the shepherds and shepherdesses follows. A servant enters, announcing that Autolycus has ballads and ribbons for sale. He enters, sings a song with Mopsa and Dorcas, and goes in with the Clown to sell his wares. Meanwhile, Florizel and Perdita are about to announce their engagement when Polixenes removes his disguise, shouts threats, and storms off. Camillo advises Florizel to escape to Sicilia with Perdita. Autolycus happens by and he and Florizel exchange clothes. Camillo, Florizel, and Perdita go to the coast. The Shepherd and Clown, afraid of being executed and with the objects that prove Perdita's true identity, run into the disguised Autolycus. He tricks them into getting onboard a ship bound for Sicilia.

ACT V

In Sicilia, Cleomenes advises Leontes to marry again, Paulina convinces him only to marry with her permission. A Gentlemen enters and says Prince Florizel has arrived with a beautiful princess. As Leontes is greeting them, Emilia announces that Polixenes, Camillo, the Shepherd, and the Clown are all approaching the palace looking for Florizel and Perdita. Leontes agrees to help the two young lovers.

Autolycus, two gentlemen, and a lady discuss how Leontes and Polixenes have been reconciled and Perdita's true identity discovered. Everyone is to go to Paulina's house to see a newly finished statue of Hermione.

After seeing other art works in Paulina's house, Leontes and the rest go the chapel in her house to see the statue of Hermione.
